A dense, scannable reference for the Cisco Certified Support Technician (CCST) Networking exam — an entry-level credential aimed at help desk and IT support technicians.

- The exam voucher covers a single attempt; a separate voucher is needed for each of the 3 CCST exams, so budget accordingly if retesting.
- Vouchers can be redeemed at a Certiport Authorized Testing Center or scheduled for remote proctoring.
- No formal prerequisites are enforced, but Cisco recommends candidates have real-world exposure before sitting the exam.

Who This Exam Is For

CCST Networking is explicitly positioned as an entry point into the Cisco certification track and the recommended first step toward CCNA — treat it as a foundation exam, not a deep technical one.

The 6 Official Content Domains

1. Standards and Concepts — TCP/IP model, OSI model, frames vs. packets, and network types (LAN, WAN, MAN, CAN, PAN, WLAN).
2. Addressing and Subnet Formats — private vs. public addressing, IPv4 addresses and subnet formats, IPv6 addresses

and prefix formats.

3. Endpoints and Media Types — cables and connectors, Wi-Fi vs. cellular vs. wired technologies, connecting devices across different operating systems.
4. Infrastructure — Cisco device status lights, reading network diagrams and cabling, device ports, basic routing and switching concepts.
5. Diagnosing Problems — troubleshooting methodology, packet capture with Wireshark, basic diagnostic commands, and basic Cisco device show commands.
6. Security — firewall traffic filtering, foundational security concepts (CIA, AAA), and configuring basic wireless security (WPA, WPA2, WPA3).

Cisco's official objective document does not publish a percentage weighting for each domain, so do not assume any domain is safe to skip — treat all six as equally testable.

Key Terms and Concepts to Memorize

- OSI vs. TCP/IP models — know the layer names, order, and what encapsulates what (data, segment, packet, frame, bits).
- Private IPv4 ranges — memorize the RFC 1918 blocks (10.0.0.0/8, 172.16.0.0/12, 192.168.0.0/16) and how they differ from public addressing.
- IPv6 shorthand rules — zero compression (::), leading-zero omission, and standard prefix notation.
- CIA triad — Confidentiality, Integrity, Availability, the backbone of the security domain.
- AAA — Authentication, Authorization, Accounting.
- WPA/WPA2/WPA3 — know which is deprecated, which is current baseline, and what each adds (e.g., stronger encryption, forward secrecy in WPA3).
- Cisco device status lights — link/activity LEDs and what solid vs. blinking vs. off typically indicates.
- Common show commands — recognize commands used to check interface status, routing tables, and basic device configuration.
- Cable/connector types — straight-through vs. crossover, fiber vs. copper, common connector families (RJ45, LC/SC for fiber).

Common Gotchas and Traps

- Don't assume there's a published passing percentage to aim for — this exam is strictly pass/fail with no disclosed cut score, so there's no partial-credit strategy to game.
- Frames vs. packets vs. segments are frequently confused — anchor each term to its OSI layer, not just "data going over the network."
- Public vs. private addressing questions often hinge on recognizing RFC 1918 ranges at a glance — memorize the three blocks cold.
- Diagnosing Problems questions may reference Wireshark captures or show-command output — practice reading, not just naming, these tools.
- Security domain questions can blend AAA and CIA concepts in the same scenario — don't treat them as separate silos.
- Because domain weighting isn't published, don't neglect the security or diagnostics domains just because they feel secondary to core addressing topics.

Night-Before Checklist

- Confirm your testing method — Certiport Authorized Testing Center in person, or remote proctoring — and double-check the exact appointment time and any ID requirements.
- Re-verify your voucher is valid for exam code 100-150 specifically, since each CCST exam requires its own separate voucher.
- Do a final pass on all 6 domains rather than deep-diving one topic — breadth matters more than depth for this entry-level exam.

- Review the OSI/TCP/IP layer order and private IPv4 ranges one more time; these fundamentals underpin multiple domains.
- Skim basic Cisco show commands and status-light meanings so you can recognize them quickly under the 50-minute time limit.
- Get sleep — with only 50 minutes on the clock, mental speed matters as much as knowledge recall.
