Everything below is fair game on the North Carolina knowledge exam. Read it twice tonight, once tomorrow morning, and let the shapes and numbers do the heavy lifting.

Sign Shapes

- Octagon — stop; red with white letters.
- Downward triangle — yield; red and white.
- Diamond — warning; yellow with black symbols.
- Pentagon — school zone or school crossing.
- Round — railroad advance warning.

Sign Colors

- Orange — construction or work zone.
- Blue — motorist services: gas, food, lodging.
- Brown — recreational and cultural areas.
- White rectangle, black letters — regulatory; it is law, not advice.

Pavement Markings

- Yellow lines — traffic moving in opposite directions.
- White lines — lanes moving the same direction.
- Solid yellow on your side — no passing.
- Broken yellow on your side — pass only when the oncoming lane is clear.
- Double solid yellow — no passing from either direction.

Signals

- Steady yellow — red is coming; stop if you safely can.
- Flashing red — full stop, then go when safe (stop-sign rules).
- Flashing yellow — slow down, proceed with caution.

Right-of-Way

- Four-way stop — first to arrive goes; a tie yields to the right.
- Left turn — yield to oncoming traffic until a real gap opens.
- School bus with flashing reds and stop arm — both directions stop, unless you are opposite on a divided highway.
- Emergency vehicle behind you — pull to the right edge and stop.
- Roundabout — yield to traffic already circulating.
- Driveway exit — sidewalk pedestrians first, then road traffic.

Speed and Space

- Three-second following gap in good conditions; stretch it in rain, ice, or behind big vehicles.
- Posted limit is a maximum for ideal conditions — slow for weather, darkness, fog.
- Fog — drive so you can stop within the distance you can see.
- Hydroplaning — off the gas, steady wheel, no hard braking.
- Ice forms first and melts last on bridges, overpasses, and shade.

Alcohol and Drugs

- 0.08 — adult per se limit in a private vehicle.
- 0.04 — limit behind the wheel of a commercial vehicle.
- Implied consent — driving means consenting to chemical testing; refusal is an automatic suspension.
- Only time sobers; coffee, showers, and exercise do not.
- Judgment goes first; medications can impair alone or multiply alcohol.

North Carolina Licensing Numbers

- Level 1 Limited Learner Permit — ages 15 to 17.
- Adults 18 and older — apply in person; may start with a learner permit.
- Driver education — 30 classroom hours plus a vision/medical screening; minimum 6 hours behind the wheel.
- Level 1 permit fee — \$25.50.
- First 6 months on Level 1 — supervised only, 5 a.m. to 9 p.m.; no mobile devices in the vehicle.
- New license — 60-day Temporary Driving Certificate while the card arrives by mail.

Night-Before Strategy

- Answer sign questions from shape and color before rereading the question text.
- For marking questions, name the color, then ask: solid or broken on my side?
- In right-of-way questions, the answer that yields more is usually the answer.
- Reject any answer promising a shortcut to sobriety or an excuse to hold speed in bad conditions.
